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About Preterm Birth

Preterm birth is when a baby is born before 37 weeks of pregnancy. Babies that are born preterm may have health problems, such as lung or brain damage and problems with vision.

According to the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, women who have had previous preterm births are more likely to have another preterm birth in later pregnancies. Generally, babies that are born after 37 weeks of gestation are more likely to be healthier.

About This Research Study

The purpose of this research study is to determine if weekly injections of an investigational study drug reduce the rate of early delivery. This research will also evaluate the health of the newborn baby.

The study drug will be compared to placebo, which is an injection that is like the study drug, but does not contain active study medication. Depending upon how long you have been pregnant when you enter this research study, participation may last for approximately 20 weeks.

There will be approximately 1700 women enrolled in the United States, Canada and several other countries. Your participation could contribute to reducing the number of preterm births.

About Participation In A Research Study

Before being medically evaluated for participation in this research study, you will be asked to review and sign an informed consent form. The informed consent form will provide you with many details about this study and should help to answer the questions you may have.

Participation is strictly voluntary and will not change the way you and your doctor decide to manage your pregnancy.
